

#### 2025 Pastor's Report





Therefore, it is my joy to share with you some of the exciting things Allegan United Methodist Church has done since our last Church Conference in August of 2024. I will have, undoubtedly, forgotten to include something in this report that should not have been overlooked, but I will do my best and ask for your grace. That said, no one can deny that it's been a busy year, where we've faced new challenges, walked through exciting changes, and celebrated blessings plenty!

From Lasagna Dinner fundraisers to the UWF Christmas Bazaar, we have been working hard in service and offering hospitality to those entering our building. A building which is certainly aging, with the oldest wing being 120 years old, but our Trustees and members have been working hard in tending to its care. There have been many improvements, like a resealed parking lot, and new Fellowship Hall blinds. Last fall we were able to replace the roof over our sanctuary, and this winter there are more major repairs to be made – particularly in the sanctuary. Quotes for the work range widely, and the Trustees are working to determine what needs are most pressing as we enter winter. Conversations continue on what future work is needed, and how we might best utilize our space for our ministry.

Speaking of conversations, last November and January the congregation participated in two Courageous Conversations events to discuss the results of the 2024 General Conference, and even more people later participated in a survey to help leadership determine the congregation's opinions regarding how AUMC might respond to those changes. Of the 52 survey respondents, 50% were comfortable with our church hosting same-sex weddings, 25% were neutral or unsure, and 25% were not comfortable with it. In regards to accepting the appointment of a pastor who identifies as gay, 50% were comfortable, 26.9% were neutral or unsure, and 23% were not comfortable with it. Many of the Courageous Conversations participants expressed gratitude for the opportunity to talk with one another, even within disagreement.

And yet, even as we had challenging conversations around change, we also celebrated a great deal of it as well! We banded together with our new District Branch #2 to assemble 40 UMCOR Flood Relief Buckets — with AUMC contributing enough supplies for 18 of those buckets! We also received a Midwest Missions loom from Hopkins UMC and managed to weave 4 sleeping mats out of grocery bags, and we plan to pass the loom on to another UMC soon. We finalized and implemented our new Protection Policy that will aid us in providing a more comfortable and welcoming space for young families and vulnerable adults. And while we grieved the loss of several beloved members this past year, we also celebrated the baptism of little Clayton, as well as 6 new members taking their membership vows to join our church family! While sadly our Girl Scout Troop has disbanded, our Boy Scouts/Scouting America troop continues to grow in numbers as well as having a great group of helping parents. The troop continues with fund raising, making pasties, supporting county & state with road pick-up, as well as traditional camping, working on merit badges, etc.

Thanks to our Bell Choir, Chancel Choir, and so many other people who have lent their gifts, the Holy Spirit has continued to bless us in our worship. Whether it is for Lent or a Blessing of the Animals service, we've shared worship with area United Methodist, Episcopal and Lutheran congregations. And this church continues to grab Holy Humor Sunday by the horns and run with it in a truly exceptional way that always brings joy.

In 2024 we were able to increase our giving to Ministry Shares by 32%, and we've worked hard this year to continue that growth by dedicating our Change Jars and seasonal Ag/Bake Table to assist in that fundraising. This congregation continues its generosity in missional giving, so far this year having given over \$2,000 to various charitable organizations and missions, not including the over \$4,000 given to the food pantry alone. Indeed, the Hands of Grace Food Pantry continues to be a jewel in this church's crown, as a valuable way we serve and build relationships with our community. So far this year the Pantry has served 809 households, totaling 2,555 people! That's 2,555 people who experienced the grace of our Lord and encountered the face of Jesus in each one of our many dedicated volunteers.

Needless to say, I'm so deeply proud of all that this congregation has endured and accomplished as the body of Christ this year, and I'm excited to see what God has in store for us in this next year!

It was fun watching folks going up and checking the bids on the item or items they wanted right up to 7:00 p.m., when the winning bids were announced. Arlene had her eye on an antique candy dish and I can't tell how many times she went up there to be sure no one had outbid her. Fortunately for her, she won the bid! We are a family at Allegan United Methodist Church and we hope the others who came felt the love that dwells amongst us. When we come together and work together our relationship with our church family grows be it the fair parade, garage sale, special dinners, and so much more. I am very proud of my church and my church family. Willard and I can't help out as much as we used to but we support every effort made to keep our church afloat for AUMC owns a part of our hearts.

Dear God, Sometimes we have to pull up our boot straps and get to work to help our church out. Thank you for bringing me to this church 62 years ago as I am proud to call myself a member! You, God, are alive and well at AUMC as You are in the hearts of Your people as love grows here, take a look around you. Amen -Blessings Judy

## Financial Corner - November 2025

Fantastic Lasagna and Silent Auction Fund Raiser – Stretch and Be Fearless – The Power of Generosity – Was definitely in the air on Saturday October 18<sup>th</sup> at the Allegan united Methodist Church. This year's Fundraiser was a huge success, as we fed 210 people. 117 people came and dined in at the Church from 5:00 – 7:00pm and 93 dinners were picked up and taken home. We had 27 items donated for the Silent Auction – thank you to all who donated and to those that bought.

Dinners = \$3,229

Silent Auction = \$1,929

Total = \$5158

A special thank you to everyone for making, serving, clean up, and buying of everything on this joyous fun event.

#### September 2025 Balances:

General Fund = \$9,873- down almost \$7,000 from 2024 year end.

Trustee Fund = \$38,694 - up almost \$3,000 from 2024 year end.

Food Pantry = \$2,967 - down almost \$7,000 from 2024 year end

Memorial Fund = \$8,707 - same balance from 2024 year end,

Mutual Fund = \$127,905 - up almost \$22,000 from 2024 year end.

NOTE: \$10,000 was paid back from Trustees account to Mutual Fund in mid-March. This is \$10,000 of the \$20,000 borrowed in 2024 for Sanctuary roof replacement.

#### 2025 Budget:

The 2025 budget through 9 months is about \$5,000 below plan. We continue to watch this number as our budget was put together this year with a lot of faith that expenses would be kept down. Expenses are basically at plan; however income is running somewhat behind plan. Last 4 weeks of giving have been up so, hopefully we can make it through the end of the year with the Fundraising donations.

<u>New 2026 Budgeting</u> – The 2026 Budget has been created with new numbers given to us by the Conference and our SPRC team. The Ministry Shares requested for 2026 is \$15,699.

The New Budget total is \$219,192 up approximately \$3,000 from last year.

The Stewardship drive will be starting on Sunday November 2. Sermons for the next 4 weeks will be associated with the Drive for this year. Sunday November 30 will be the Final Pledge day when Pledge Cards will be turned in. A letter will go out to the Congregation o Monday November 3. A follow up letter with the pledge cards will be mailed out on November 17. (Pledge cards can be turned in at any point once they are received to the Church office either by mail or dropping them off.)

<u>Building Update</u> - Bill Austin and I met with a Plaster Company recently. They were a little more positive than the previous company. They are still looking into what needs to be done and are working on getting us a quote. More to come as we know.

The Finance team continues to work very hard to make good decision and to use our funds to their fullest extent. If you ever have any ideas or thought for us to consider please let any of the members know.
